

Can you explain what a plant needs to be healthy? Light, water, nutrients.

Can you name three parts of a plant? Roots, leaves, stem.

Can you describe one job of the roots? Take food and water from the soil. Help to give the plant nutrients. Help the plant to stand tall in the ground.

Do all leaves look the same? No - they can be different sizes/ shapes/ colours.

What do you think might happen if a plant had no roots? Unable to get food/water from the soil. Unable to stand up - might fall over.

What do you think might happen if one part of the plant stopped doing its job? Sensible answers, e.g. Other parts would have to work harder/plant may start to die.

Why do you think the stem has the job of carrying water and nutrients to different parts of the plant? Sensible answers, e.g. tube shape/connects roots with leaves and flower.

Can you identify one of the headings? Roots, Leaves, Stems.

What does a heading tell us? Headings tell us what the next part of the text is about.
